The simple arrangement of foliage & flowers on the coffin, arranged without floral foam in a structure of oak branches & moss, will no doubt have inspired many arrangers to consider using environmentally friendly mechanics.

It was a lovely joyous afternoon for our Platinum Anniversary year Open Meeting where we welcomed National Demonstrator, Tracey Griffin - the Title being 'Not Your Usual Flower Fix'. Tracey has a wealth of floristry expertise, nationally and globally and a string of qualifications. She has seen incredible success and won multiple awards - one of only two gold medals in the Chelsea florist of the year competition at the world famous RHS Chelsea Flower Show. We were not to be disappointed.

Her first design showed great use of lentils in the form of bowls, for Leucospermum, and Strelitzia native to South Africa.



Tracey also showed how Holland is now using hydration bags. The audience was captivated as stories evolved along with striking displays. Tracey worked effortlessly explaining she had seen firsthand the changes and challenges within the florist industry. Her second wired design had a focal point of a polyclay sphere with some elegant pink snow berries and brassicas (ornamental cabbages) whilst orchids added to the enchanted look.

The Third design featured lilies, no foliage and a heightened linear design with contorted willow. The fourth design aptly titled "Through The Window" using test tubes and wire all cleverly hidden by more stunning flowers and my favourite Moët Gerberas, also known as the African daisy.

Finally our piece-de-resistance: the fifth display was a traditional design using an urn with oasis. This drew gasps of breath as it was so beautiful; magnolias and cascading branches, picking up the gladioli colour. As we watched Tracey filling in she explained she always uses a knife instead of floristry's secateurs to avoid pressure on the stems.



A million claps late,r after all the inventiveness and displays of richness and variety, we finished this amazing and fantastic journey of floral discovery.

This was one audience at the Assembly Rooms who had been truly wowed.

We had two raffles one for flowers the other to celebrate 70 years included Champagne, a D&G bag, chocolates, wine, plants, a garden voucher. and a voucher for tea at The Ivy. Our president Carol Hipperson gave the vote of thanks.

All components were supplied, giving a good selection of paints/ serviettes/flowers & trimmings. Beverly also displayed a few other ways of using decoupage onto polystyrene bowls/rings and as a backdrop for a metal stand.

Now came the choice of which paints & which serviettes to use - Thankfully enough for everyone to choose from.

It was a sunny day and members were able to spray safely outside.

Torn up serviettes were then attached using a mix of PVA glue and water.

A bit of a waiting game for the canvas to dry but everyone had brought a lunch box so it was nice to chat among friends.

With the outside sunshine and the use of a hair dryer it wasn't long before the finishes touches could be made,

Attaching the tubes was a bit fiddly but everyone was patient and mastered it.

Trimmings of choice, foliage, flowers and contorted hazel added and the design were completed. Everyone had enjoyed the day and hoped to create more canvas designs in future.



New Creations Floral Design Club

Our Autumn workshop was held at the end of September when Moira Neville demonstrated foliage manipulation techniques - plaiting equisetum (snake grass) to form 3D structures & wrapping/folding/spraying aspidistra leaves. She then showed us a wide variety of designs incorporating these core techniques with other interesting elements such as small branches, ornamental grasses, decorative wire & single headed, statement flowers. Once we had mastered these techniques, we were encouraged to experiment on how to use them within a design. At the end of the day there was an amazing array of arrangements, and we went home determined to perfect our foliage manipulation and try out more ideas. All in all, a challenging day!

We started this year's competition in October with one entitled 'Floral Cocktail'.

So, the lovely Jenni Baker very kindly stepped in and brought along her demonstration entitled 'Memories of India'. Jenni told us of her journey to compete in the WAFA show in India in 2019. At the Norfolk and Norwich Horticultural Society's Late Autumn show in November, our member Tricia Loades came first in the flower arranging class 'White Christmas' which was one of the classes in the Show Title 'Let me entertain you'.



"Do you listen to a piece of music and visualise a flower arrangement?" asks "Spotlight East" Editor, Lindi Carrington.

This was the theme of an on-line virtual competition "Synaesthesia: A Blurring of Floral Art & Music" which took place earlier this year. It was the brainchild of Kim Zimmerman, Floral Designer, Judge & Administrator of the Facebook page "Floral ART Re- Imagined" The show was open to all floral art designers from anywhere in the world who wished to participate and was judged by WAFA rules. Most of the classes were judged by more than one panel of judges, sometimes from different continents, so that there was a truly worldwide perspective on the designs. This meant that the time between submitting our entries, mid-April, and the announcement of the results in early September was much longer than the organisers had anticipated.

There was an amazing choice of class titles (36 in all) ranging from interpretations of musical terminology like "Allegro" or "Staccato". Then there were musical genres – "Punk Rock", "Lullaby" "Reggae." Or the opportunity to interpret song titles: "A Whiter Shade of Pale", or maybe the lyrics of Dylan's "Mr. Tambourine Man" or Coldplay's "Yellow". I opted for the "Inspired by Listening to Music" section and eventually chose Class 34 – 'Gymnopedia no.1' – Erik Satie

I find it is a strangely repetitive, wandering, piece of music. It has those dreamlike qualities where familiar items appear in unusual contexts; calm, happy but rather odd. The judges' comments were very constructive, pointing out minor technical defects whilst being wholehearted about my interpretation. I was delighted to be placed Second.



Members of **Little Hallingbury Flower Club**, along with other local flower arrangers, were delighted to support the Tudor Festival at St Giles church Great Hallingbury on 1st & 2nd Oct. The church was beautifully decorated for the festival which celebrated the local royal links in the Tudor period. Other events for the Tudor Weekend included a Tudor themed fete, a concert of Period Music, a service of Choral Matins from the 1549 & a lecture about Jane Boleyn.



"A Celebration of Flowers" - Peterborough Cathedral, 29th - 31st October.

The celebratory exhibition, co-ordinated by Peterborough Floral Decoration Society, produced a stunning array of traditional & contemporary flower arrangements, bringing a splash of Autumn colour to the beautiful fan-vaulted New Building at the east end of the Cathedral. Area Chairman, Barbara Collins, who is on the Committee of the Society and one of the Cathedral's volunteer flower arrangers, said:

"We had planned this exhibition for 2020 when it was the 65th anniversary of our Society, but the pandemic had other ideas. We are delighted that at last we can showcase the skills and artistry, not just of our own members but those of neighbouring clubs too. We hope that people will really enjoy seeing these uplifting displays and that we can also raise some money for the Cathedral. Many people find flower arranging a relaxing pastime which can benefit your mental health."



Participating Flower Clubs included Bourne, Brampton, Peterborough, Stamford, Werrington & Yaxley. The exhibition showed a contrasting array of traditional and contemporary floral designs & techniques, with the participants choosing how to depict their titles and show off the glorious autumn blooms to their best advantage.





As visitors headed towards the exhibition area they saw a display of poppies falling from the upper level of the Cathedral. This artwork remained in place until Remembrance Sunday on 13th November.



There was a piano recital at the cathedral on the Saturday evening, by the internationally renowned pianist, Janusz Piotrowicz, giving the audience the opportunity to view the floral exhibition during the interval, and perhaps introduce more members of the public to the delights of flower arranging.

Indeed, their efforts for the Area were recognised when they were both made Life Members – both of them being surprised when the then Area President presented them with their badges.



Many years ago, Bryan and Pat were heavily involved in the annual flower show held in Ipswich and of course Bryan worked tirelessly at the Suffolk Show each year helping with the erection of the floral marquee and the staging. He was always a great help to exhibitors assisting with the moving of heavy boxes and accessories. Of course, Pat was a prolific competitor at the Suffolk Show and Bryan took immense prize in her many awards over the years. Similarly, Bryan was always there to help the Area with any unusual projects – and who can possibly forget him in his fishing waders in the pond when we were staging a shoot for The Flower Arranger Magazine? Only Bryan could possibly have thought to bring his waders!



Indeed, there appeared to be nothing that Bryan could not fix. The Area were invited to stage a huge exhibit at the famous Southport Flower Show back in the early 2000's. Bryan and Pat arrived in his van ready for every possible need whilst the rest of the team arrived via the Nine Elms flower market with all the flowers and foliage – including a 5-foot stem of bananas. They had no idea how it was going to be used or staged but within no time at all Bryan had sorted the problem and it stood proud in the midst of the Gold Award exhibit – and was actually featured on the local television and radio.

Bryan is irreplaceable in the Area and can never be replaced in our hearts – or Pat's. He is sorely missed but will be long remembered by everyone in the East of England.
